**WHAT:** Wylie firefighters known as the Wylie Wild Bunch return to Wylie ISD elementary schools, private schools and day cares with a new 30-minute, live, fire prevention program, "Danger Busters," based on "Ghostbusters." The high-energy, comical, interactive presentation, set this year in a fire station, emphasizes the importance of having working smoke detectors in every bedroom, EDITH (exit drill in the home), checking doors with the back of a hand for heat, calling 911, and stop, drop and roll.

Every performance will feature students and teachers pulled from the audience to participate in the program. A set, designed and built by firefighters, serves as the backdrop for this year's show.
