Police pondering voluntary camera registration program

The police department is asking residents about their thoughts on voluntarily registering their home security cameras with the department.

Registering cameras would not give police unfettered access to video feeds, Lt. Colin Chenault said, but would only point police in the direction of where to look when a crime occurs.

Under the program, officers would contact homeowners for footage only in the event of a criminal offense, Chenault said

"This is not an authorization to allow the police unrestricted access to a camera system," he said. "It is simply a way to let us know where to start looking."

Police seek suspect in shooting through recording studio door

Dallas police have released surveillance video images showing a suspect in the shooting of a man early Wednesday morning at a Deep Ellum

recording studio. Officers responded to the 2800 block of Main Street just before 6 a.m. Wednesday, after a man repeatedly banged on the door of Legacy Music Group. When the victim asked him to leave, the shooter pulled out a handgun and fired through the door, striking the victim in the shoulder.

The shooter fled before officers arrived. He is described as a Hispanic or black male in his mid-20s with a sleeve tattoo on his right arm. He was wearing a light-colored T-shirt and a baseball cap and was last seen carrying a backpack.

The wounded man was taken to Baylor University Medical Center with non-life-threatening injuries. The case is still under investigation.

Suspect arrested in fatal shooting at apartments

A murder suspect has been arrested in a February shooting in which Dallas police had little more than two nicknames to work with.

Thomas DeWayne Scott, 20, was booked into the Dallas County Jail about 7 p.m. Tuesday. He remains there on a murder charge, with bail set at \$100,000.

Police suspect two men, nicknamed Dooney and Tinky, or Lil' Tinker, shot and killed 45-year-old Sedric Ballard at noon Feb. 5 at the Jac Ray Apartments on Bonnie View Road. Detectives said they eventually determined Dooney was Scott. Lil' Tinker remains unidentified.

Police say the vandal apparently never entered the church, and nothing was taken. The only things out of place were the bricks removed from the church's sign and tossed through the windows.

Pastor Deb Loudin McCann told Channel 4 that the vandal is welcome at the church anytime.

Judge drops man's lawsuit against Police Department

A Dallas County judge has dropped a lawsuit against the Police Department filed by a man named by Dallas Police Chief David Brown as a person of interest in a series of highprofile sex assaults.

Alan Mason alleged negligence in a lawsuit filed in September and sought damages between \$200,000 and \$1 million. The lawsuit was dismissed in March, court records show.

Brown named Mason as a person of interest in connection with a string of rapes in 2013 in the South Dallas area. After Brown's tweet, Mason was arrested on a probation violation charge in connection with a DWI.

DNA evidence linked Van Dralan Dixson to the attacks. He pleaded guilty last year to four counts of aggravated assault in the attacks and is serving a life sentence.

Though police never called Mason a suspect, the lawsuit alleged he received death threats, harassment and was being labeled a rapist. He said he was "recklessly detained, falsely accused, arrested, jailed and ultimately held in solitary confinement for nine days."

Injured construction worker rescued from 5th-floor job site

A construction worker was injured at a job site in the Victory Park area Wednesday morning.

Dallas Fire-Rescue's search-andrescue team was sent about 11:30 a.m. to the 2500 block of Alamo Street to rescue the worker, who was injured on the fifth floor of a building.

Officials did not disclose how the worker was injured, but KTVT-TV (Channel 11) reported a wall collapsed on him.

Rescuers placed the man in the basket of a ladder tower and then lowered the basket to the ground floor, Dallas Fire-Rescue spokesman Jason Evans said.

The worker was then taken to a hospital and was listed as stable.
